

Use of Pupil Premium at Garden Fields

In 2011-12 the Government launched its Pupil Premium funding. This money is sent to schools based on the numbers of pupils in the school who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), Children Looked After (CLA) and armed forces children. From 2012-13 this was expanded to include all children who have been eligible for FSM within the last 6 years.

This money is allocated to initiatives to ensure pupils reach their full potential, both academically and socially.

In 2016-17 the school received £40,300 in Pupil Premium funding.

We aim to raise the attainment and achievement of Pupil Premium pupils to ensure that they reach age related expectations through the following support:

- Provision of additional staffing to raise levels in Reading, Writing and Mathematics.
- Provision of emotional and social support for both pupils and families to improve and ensure good attendance, behaviour in order to develop positive attitudes to learning.
- Enhance experiences and increase access to activities that both support and engage pupils in achieving age related standards.

This money was used to help provide for the following initiatives:-
