

Use of Pupil Premium at Garden Fields

In 2011-12 the Government launched its Pupil Premium funding. This money is sent to schools based on the numbers of pupils in the school who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), Children Looked After (CLA) and armed forces children. From 2012-13 this was expanded to include all children who have been eligible for FSM within the last 6 years.

This money is allocated to initiatives to ensure pupils reach their full potential, both academically and socially.

Plan for Pupil Premium for 2019/20 (To be reviewed September 2020)

For the 2019/20 academic year we are planning on the basis of £50160 of Pupil Premium (PP) funding for the year. This can vary if children become eligible for the funding over the year or if new children join the school and are entitled to it.

Some of the barriers to educational achievement faced by our pupils in receipt of pupil premium are as follows:

- ***Difficulty with literacy and numeracy skills***
- ***Some also have Specific Learning Difficulties (Including Dyslexia)***
- ***Poorer life opportunities because they don't have the financial means to attend extra-curricular clubs and school residential trips***
- ***Some children have additional language barriers as they speak English as an additional language***

Review of 2018/19

In 2018/19 we planned on the basis of £52800 of Pupil Premium (PP) funding for the year. This can vary if children become eligible for the funding over the year or if new children join the school and are entitled to it.

In order to overcome some of these barriers to learning, our use of PP money for the 2018/19 academic provided the following:
